

Mission

To develop resources and build partnerships in support of the $exceptional\ health\ care\ provided$ by UPMCAltoona.

SUPPORT FOR

Cancer Services

The Foundation allocated funds to help cancer patients during and after treatment.

UPMC Altoona Radiation Oncology Department

Several donors generously provided funds to remodel the patient treatment areas. Also, Foundation funding purchased kits for patients to participate in Look Good, Feel Better. This free workshop teaches a 12-step skin care and makeup program and gives each participant a free cosmetics kit. The Foundation



also provided funds for wigs for patients with hair loss, as well as gift cards for nutrition assistance.

Saint Francis University is using its grant to *expand in-home* rehab for rural cancer survivors.

St. Francis University

Funding has helped the university's Center for Rural Cancer Survivorship continue and expand rehabilitation services for rural cancer survivors through the convenience of in-home rehab equipment. The funds will be used for training kits that will include heart monitors, exercise mats, resistance bands, ankle weights, and stability balls.

Bob Perks Cancer Assistance Fund

The Foundation is proud to support this nonprofit that provides short-term financial assistance to cancer patients unable to pay for basic necessities like rent, utilities, and food, while having treatment. Bolstered by Foundation funds, this allows patients to focus on treatment and recovery.



Black Lung Clinic

The Foundation applied for and received grant money to benefit the region's coal miners. The grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration to the Pennsylvania Black Lung COALition's UPMC Altoona Black Lung Clinic assures former and current coal miners continued medical support. The coalition is an independent, federally funded partnership helping black lung or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease patients gain medical attention and compensation necessary for a better quality of life.

SUPPORT FOR

Health Services

The Foundation allotted funds to enhance and expand medical and dental care for the people of the area.



The MONARCH® Platform. the first robotic platform for diagnostic and therapeutic bronchoscopic procedures, is designed to allow physicians to access small, hard-to-reach peripheral lung nodules with greater precision than ever before.

Thoracic Surgery

Funding was allotted for the purchase of revolutionary flexible endoscopic robotics technology for bronchoscopy procedures that can detect cancer in the lungs at a much earlier stage than less advanced equipment. This is

particularly important when a physician is looking for metastatic diseases, such as breast cancer, that can move to the lungs.

Cardiology

A generous donor gifted funds to secure additional electrophysiology ablation equipment for the opening of a second procedure room to meet the community's growing need for this service. The funds also supported bringing another specialist to the community.

An electrophysiology study measures the electrical activity of the heart and diagnoses an abnormal heart rhythm. A catheter ablation procedure treats some types of abnormal rhythms.

Behavioral Health

The Foundation granted funds to UPMC Behavioral Health of the Alleghenies for program support and patient assistance. The Altoona-based behavioral health center provides community-based mental health, special needs, substance abuse, and behavioral health services.

A grant to the dental clinic will ensure that its equipment remains state-of-the-art and that it can continue to provide reliable, uninterrupted care to all patients regardless of their ability to pay.

SUPPORT FOR **Education**

The Foundation provided funding for education for all ages-from high school to college students to adult learners.

Mount Aloysius College

Funding supported teaching sign language to high school students and parents of deaf children and preparing college students to teach sign

The college also received funding to teach advanced cardiac life support to high school students and to help it purchase a mobile interactive telemedicine cart.

Saint Francis University



Funding was provided to purchase point-of-care ultrasound equipment for its Physician Assistant Science program. The technology is used at a patient's bedside for diagnostic or therapeutic purposes.

Altoona Area High School

Funds were granted for vaping education and prevention, as well as detection. Vaping is highly addictive. Nationally in 2020, the percentage of 10th and 12th graders who said they vaped nicotine in the past 12 months was 30.7 and 34.5 percent respectively.

Bishop Guilfoyle High School

The school received a grant for EKG equipment for students in its anatomy and physiology courses who are pursuing careers in the medical field.
